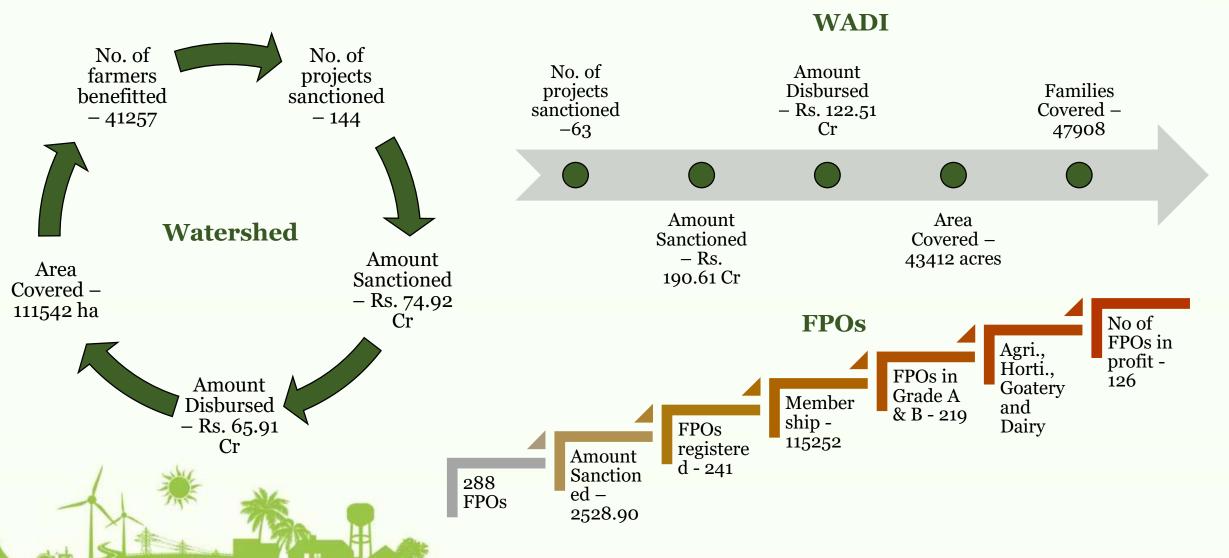

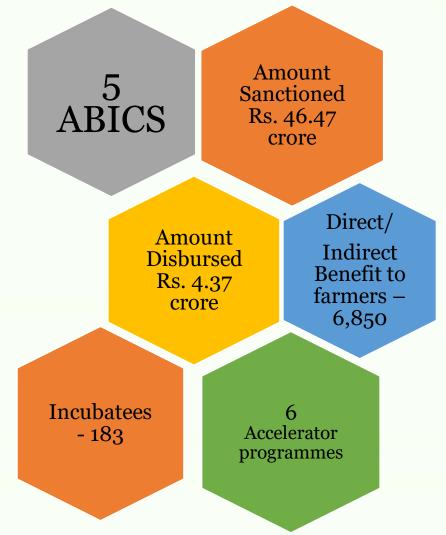

## Formalisation of Micro Food Processing Enterprises



#### Aim

- Modernize and enhance competitiveness of existing micro enterprises and ensure their transition to formal sector
- Support FPOs/ SHGs/ Cooperatives for delivery of package of services
- Creation of common infrastructure along the value chain,
- Ensure backward & forward linkages, branding & marketing

#### Salient features

- Centrally Sponsored Scheme with an Outlay of ₹10,000 crore for 5 years from 2020-21 to 2024-25
- Coverage of 2,00,000 enterprises
- Expenditure to be shared by Government of India and States at 60:40
- About ₹25,000 cr investment is expected under the programme
- Cluster approach and Focus on perishables

#### **Support**

- Micro Units: 35% of the eligible project cost with a ceiling of ₹10 lakh. (ii) Beneficiary contribution will be minimum 10% and balance through loan.
- Support for FPOs/ SHGs/ Cooperatives: (i) Seed capital to SHGs (@ ₹4 lakh per SHG for loan to members for working capital and small tools (ii) Grant
- Handholding support
